#### **Aetna's Depression Management Program**

Aetna's new program for primary care providers identifies depression in patients through universal screening. This is a great development for ARNPs in Washington state. The following is a summary on how the program operates.

The form used to screen for Depression/Anxiety is the PHQ-9 depression screening tool (see website following this article). A positive screening equals answering "More than half the days" or "Nearly every day" to questions 1 and/or 2 on the PHQ-9 form. If the patient's responses to questions 1 and/or 2 are not in the above categories, then the remainder of the PHQ-9 does not get completed by the patient. Aetna is asking that the screening tool be administered with each consecutive office visit the patient has with the ARNP, as a patient's psychosocial status can change due to life stressors, etc., and this provides ARNPs with the opportunity to earn additional income for positive screenings. Also, reimbursement for positive screenings is available in 6 month increments, meaning a patient that scores positive on the PHQ-9 today and is treated accordingly by the ARNP can be re-screened in 6 months or later - if the patient continues to score positive on the PHQ-9. the claim should reflect the additional charge for a positive screening. When a screening is positive, the ARNP treats the patient accordingly and refers the patient to Aetna telephonic Case Management services. It is imperative that the patient signs and dates the Referral to Case Management form (see attached) to meet HIPAA requirements. Upon completion of the office visit, the patient brings the PHQ-9 and CM referral form to the Receptionist to obtain a next appointment date and the Receptionist then faxes both forms to the fax number noted on the CM referral form.

The advantage of participating in this program is that for the first time, Aetna is the first insurance carrier to pay for a Depression assessment by an ARNP in addition to any other CPT-4 codes and corresponding diagnoses for the same date of service without automatic denial by Claims. The other significant advantage of participating in Aetna's Depression Management program is that Aetna provides telephonic case management services for patients referred to Case Management for positive depression screenings. The goals of Case Management are to provide the patient with telephonic support/encouragement (not psychotherapy) by a trained professional, assist the patient in obtaining an appointment with a Behavioral Health clinician if the ARNP recommends this or the patient requests the same, while monitoring treatment/medication compliances several studies have demonstrated that most patients prescribed anti-depressants for depressive disorders tend to a.) not fill the prescription to reap the benefits of psychopharmacology, and b.) discontinue their medications too soon due to lack of immediate response to the prescribed medications. Aetna is looking to close the gaps in care that are prevalent between medical and behavioral health services when it comes to addressing all of the patient's healthcare needs. Lastly, ARNPs can still bill for their time spent with the patient however they deem most appropriate, but in addition, they can bill using CPT-4 code 99420 and ICD-9 code V79.0 for the same date of service for patients that score positive on the PHQ-9 screening tool.

#### Perspective in the DNP

With all the talk about the Doctorate in Nursing Practice degree these days, I decided to add my "2 cents worth".

I am interested in the Doctorate in Nursing Practice because it offers me an avenue to learn more about how to better serve my patients and community in the role of a nurse practitioner (NP). As an oncology nurse practitioner, I want to develop more expertise in caring for my cancer patients' physical, emotional, and spiritual needs as they travel this path of treatment and post-treatment life.

When I graduated from my nurse practitioner program I did not feel comfortable even though I felt I had a good education. [Editors note: According to the research done by Patricia Benner and others, this feeling is normal and expected in new clinicians]. And I must admit I had chosen a broad focus to my education since I did not know what job I would be getting after graduation. I

rightly assumed that my 19 years of hospice and home health nursing would sufficiently augment my education to allow me to function as an entry level NP with a good mentor. However, I would like to be bringing more real expertise to this job and I must admit to some embarrassment at times by my knowledge deficits.

I'll share with you a palatable scenario for continuing my education: I would have graduated from my masters program, secured my employment, and started the job. Concurrently, I would have entered the optional doctoral program in nursing practice to further my education in the areas I identified (I knew them at the time) and I would have used my job to fulfill the clinical practicum requirements of the program. The course work would be part time and online so I could work from home after hours, going in to school periodically to meet with advisor, other students, etc. I would have been able to start work after the two year program so I could afford the additional education I wanted.

I would like to be better at patient assessment, pharmacological and non-pharmacological disease and symptom management, discussions about genetic testing, evidence based practice (especially how to rapidly lay my hands on the information I need), and be better at critical thinking. I'm willing to admit that these deficits may be unique to me, so I am reluctant to say that everyone must have a DNP to practice as a nurse practitioner. All I can say is that I would like the opportunity to develop the expertise I want through a formal program of education that allows me to keep my focus on my practice.

#### The Spread of Cancer

Scientists at the University of Liverpool have found how two molecules fight in the blood to control the spread of cancer cells.

Researchers discovered that a large protein, which forms a protective shield around cancer cells and prevents them from causing secondary tumors, is attacked by a small protein that exists in the blood.

In diseases such as breast, lung and colorectal cancer, infected cells lose growth control and eventually form tumors at these sites. If caught early these tumors can be effectively removed surgically. However, when the cancer cells have invaded the blood, the effectiveness of surgery is reduced.

Cancerous cells that have entered the blood, however, are still prevented from causing further disease by the protective shield of a protein called MUC1 in which the cancerous cells are eventually destroyed by our immune system. Scientists have now discovered how this protec-

tive shield is broken down, allowing cancer to spread throughout the body.

Dr Lu-Gang Yu, from the University's School of Clinical Sciences, explains: "MUC1 on the cell surface prevents the cancer cells from attaching to the blood vessel wall which causes secondary tumors. We have discovered that a small protein called galectin-3, attacks MUC1 and breaks up its protective shield, forcing large areas of the cancer cell to become exposed. The exposed areas of the cell allow the cancer to attach to the blood vessel wall. The cancer cells then eventually penetrate the blood wall to form tumors at secondary sites.

"The attachment of cancer cells to the blood vessel wall is one of the key steps in the spread of cancer. It has been known for a few years that galectin-3 concentration is significantly higher in the blood of cancer patients than in healthy people but until now scientists did not know whether this increase played any role in the spread of cancer. Our study indicates that galectin-3 may play a critical role and may have significant implications for future developments of drugs for the treatment of the disease."
